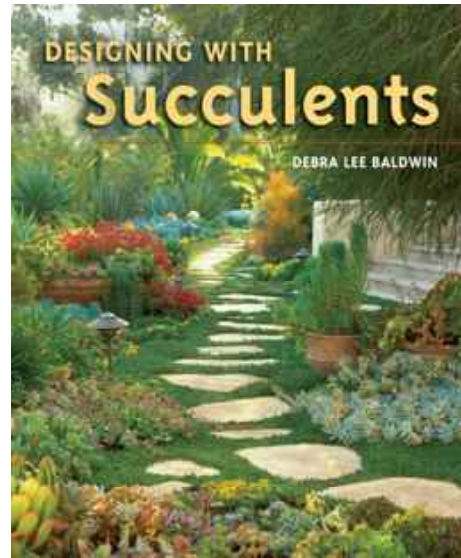

### “Grow Them From Seeds...”



Growing plants from seeds offers many rewards. It almost seems instinctual for man to enjoy growing things from seed. The process is not very difficult. In some cases you will have to do a little research first to improve your odds of success. But in the end, you can end up with plants that might be difficult or near impossible to get any other way. Also, you may encounter new forms of an old, familiar plant. Earlier this year I visited Kelley Griffin and looked at nearly 200 seed grown *Agave titanota*. I was familiar with the white-spined, green form offered at several nurseries. To my amazement there were many blue forms, some with white spines and some with black. Some had twisted spines with shorter, wider leaves. The diversity was marvelous.

Just a few years ago I tried planting my first succulent seeds. An *Agave* in my yard had seed pods. I collected some seed. I purchased some weed free potting mix, mixing it 50/50 with some perlite. Put some moistened mix in a 5x8" plastic tray (with drainage holes) I had salvaged from a microwave meal. I tapped down the soil gently. Then I planted the seeds on the surface. I then gently poured  $\frac{1}{8}$  of an inch of coarse sand on top. I watered the tray gently. Let it set an hour. Then put the tray inside a plastic bag and sealed it with a twist tie. I placed it in a kitchen garden window where it stayed warm and had plenty of light. In a few weeks little green sprouts were popping up. I let them stay in the bag until the plantlets were about  $\frac{1}{4}$  inch in diameter, and then took off the bag and started watering them every few days with a dilute water-soluble fertilizer. After they were  $1\frac{1}{2}$  inches across I moved them to individual 2" pots. Later I tried cacti and multiple other plants. Most of the time I had success, but a few learning opportunities came along. Here are a few comments:

Know the plant. Is it a summer grower or winter grower? Most winter growers need to be planted in the Fall or at least cooler weather. Summer growers seem to be more flexible but also have a higher tendency to damp off if they get cold. Big seeds tend to be easier than small seeds. *Dudleya* (winter grower) seeds for instance are like small dust particles. They can be sown by putting them into a  $\frac{1}{4}$  cup of water and then pouring the water over the sand in the "mother pot".

Keep things clean. Use plastic containers that are clean. Use new or heat sterilized potting mix and perlite. Algae and water molds can kill seeds and seedlings.

Fresh seeds have a higher germination rate. How you store seeds is important. I have had good success using paper coin envelopes in my refrigerator. Remember to be patient. Some seeds take a long time to germinate. The plants that have hard or waxy seed coatings may need to be sanded or filed to allow moisture access to start the germination process.

Fortunately the vast majority of seeds do not need exotic treatment.

Where to get seeds: join the Cactus and Succulent Society of America and they have a seed bank. Also on the Internet go to [cactus-mall.com](http://cactus-mall.com) and click on "seeds". There is a whole list of seed sellers. I have had great success with seeds from Mesa Garden. You owe it to yourself to give it a try.

Additional note from Phyllis Flechsig:

"I don't find Dudleya all that hard to plant – just grind the pods through a fine tea strainer, and sprinkle the seeds onto the medium with thumb and forefinger, like adding a pinch of salt to the soup."
