

Speaker of the Month: Gunnar Eisel

Topic: The Folklore, Enchantment, and Evolution of the Cactus and Succulent Hobby from 1889 to the Present Day



The allure of cacti and succulents has fascinated people for hundreds, if not thousands, of years. However, unlike some other horticultural endeavors, the collecting and fostering an interest in the C&S is fairly new. This program focuses on the people, the changing American landscape, and a curious set of events that have shaped our hobby as we find it today.

Bio: Gunnar Eisel's interest in cacti and succulents can be traced back to his childhood infatuation with photographing night-blooming cereus flowers and a few unfortunate encounters with opuntia glochids. His

interest in cacti became intensified through many annual trips to the Anza-Borrego desert.

Born and raised near Heidelberg, Germany, Eisel has taught music at California State University Los Angeles (CSULA), California State University Fullerton (CSUF), Whittier College, Fullerton College, and Citrus College. He recently retired as a full-time music theory and history of music professor at Citrus College in Glendora, CA where his students were occasionally subjected to his rantings regarding cacti and succulents.

An avid cactus and succulent collector, he served as Executive Director of the Cactus and Succulent Society of America (CSSA) for 15 years and as President of the San Gabriel Valley Cactus and Succulent Society.






Kevin carried heavy potted plants up and down the aisles so we could see the auction plants close up.

FEROCACTUS—BARRELS OF FUN AND SPINES!!!!

Hailing from the deserts of North America and Mexico, Ferocactus thrive under harsh sun and minimal rainfall. Its Latin name literally means "ferocious cactus," referring to its large, robust and often hooked spines. The spines develop on the globular body of the cactus, along very marked ribs, colored in a bright green, though sometimes the body can be pale green, tending to greyish with age (just like us). Only after several years will you be able to admire its beautiful flowers of multiple colors which tend to form a ring around the top of the plant. When they are pollinated, they form lemon yellow fruits and keep their dried petals even when they are ripe. Despite extremely slow

growth, they are quite ornamental from an early age thanks to their unmistakable spines, which can vary dramatically in color, even on the same plant. The shape is usually large and round up to 10' tall, but a few remain small and manageable.

Some of the 30+ species form clumps.

This genus has been nicknamed "The Traveler's Friend" due to the belief that these "living barrels" are reservoirs of fresh drinking water in the hot arid deserts just waiting to be tapped into by a parched visitor. While this idea is quite romantic, it is not recommended to drink this water as it is far too alkaline and may worsen the effects of dehydration. A far better source of water can be found in the flattened leaf-like pads of Opuntia. The Ferocactus flowers of the plant were collected and eaten dry or fresh, and the tiny black seeds were ground and eaten as well. Fishing hooks can be made from the spines. The tunas may be eaten, and some Native Americans used this plant for candy.

CULTURAL REQUIREMENTS:

Choose a location that receives direct sun during all or most of the day. They will eventually lean into the sun instead of growing precisely upright. Plant in a fast-draining soil, let dry out completely in between waterings and no need to fertilize as they thrive in poor and arid soil. They cannot tolerate freezing temperatures for extended periods, which typically cause them to yellow, bleach, then slowly die. Mealybugs can be a pest to reckon with as described in this vlog:

Propagation is usually from seeds, but clumping species such as F. robustus and F. glaucescens can be propagated by removing a rooted offset and planting it.



ALLURING ALOES

Most people recognize the word aloe in conjunction with the therapeutic, cosmetic, and medicinal properties of the leaf sap of Aloe vera. This is a commonly cultivated plant widely available almost anywhere plants are sold. Aloes have been the subject of hybridizers for years, and some amazing, almost unbelievable hybrids are available through specialty succulent plant nurseries and online. There are many hundreds of hybrids and they come in all sizes, from landscape specimens to tiny miniatures. Previously it required many years to propagate selected hybrids by normal vegetative techniques. Today, desirable hybrids are quickly propagated in tissue culture labs.

This is a hybrid miniature called Aloe 'Green Sand' or Aloe 'Vito' is a Kelly Griffin creation.
