Palomar College Cactus & Succulent Garden

August 23, 10:00 a.m. – 1:00 p.m.

An option: The garden will be open at 9:00 for members wishing to look around when it's cool.

This year we will once again visit and picnic at the Cactus & Succulent Garden at Palomar College. In 1962, our club's members designed, funded, and planted this garden, and members have done most of the caretaking since then. In 2011, PCSS donated the plants to the college.

Currently, Kevin Smith, a PCSS lifetime member, spends many hours each week maintaining the garden - adding to the plant collection and doing the never-ending pruning, watering, and weeding. If you haven't seen the garden (or seen it lately) you are in for a real treat! Some of the special plants you can see when visiting are Aloe ferox, Aloe cameronii, Euphorbia ingens, and Cholla sp.

Kevin has once again offered to lead a tour of the garden. Last year's tour was very interesting and we learned a lot!

Location - The garden is on Palomar College grounds on the corner of Comet Circle Dr. and Mission Ave. Park in Student Lot 3 as always, but unfortunately the lower half of the lot closest to the gate is now occupied by a construction company that is doing a project on the main campus. The upper half will be available for us to use, but the walking distance will be longer. Kevin will shuttle the larger, heavier items in his truck to the back gate near the picnic area. Members will still be able to enter the garden through the front gate.

Restrooms on the main campus will be available in the O building which is near the new football stadium. The emergency restroom in the garden shed will also be available.

Also, as was done last year, Kevin will have potted plants to give away free to the members (one plant per member). They will be on a table near the picnic area.

The ground is a little uneven and there is one slight hill.

As you know, hats and sunscreen are highly recommended.

Seating -There will be no chairs available, so please bring your own.

Driving Directions

From I-5 and the coastal communities: Take Highway 78 east to the Las Posas Road exit in San Marcos. At the end of the exit ramp, turn right on Grand Avenue and right again onto Las Posas Road. Take Las Posas Road north, crossing the Sprinter tracks and turning right onto Mission Road. Go straight to Comet Circle and turn left. Parking lot 3 will be on the right.

From I-15 and the inland communities: Take Highway 78 west to the Las Posas exit. At the end of the exit ramp, turn right onto Las Posas Road. Take Las Posas Road north, crossing the Sprinter tracks and turning right onto Mission Road. Go straight to Comet Circle and turn left. Parking lot 3 will be on the right.

Julian shared how he grew and pruned his Bursera fagaroides into the bonsai shown above left.




Check out the glorious Adenium bonsai!

More PC sights with Kevin pointing out interesting features. Come to the picnic and take his tour!



Kroenleinia grusonii

Kroenleinia grusonii, previously known as Echinocactus grusonii, (Golden Barrel cactus), is native to the Mexican states of Querétaro and Hidalgo. Wild populations in Mexico were adversely afffected in the 1990s as a result of poaching and the creation of the Zimapán Dam and reservoir in Hidalgo.

Although it is a very adaptable species, in its natural habitat it grows in rich, volcanic soil on well-draining, sunny slopes, and can be found at altitudes up to 4,600 feet. A single plant can grow up to $3\frac{1}{4}$ feet tall and 3 feet in width, so they really can look like a golden barrel. The golden barrel cactus also likes to create large clumps. It is among



the most popular cacti in collections and in landscaping, and has become quite popular as an architectural accent plant in contemporary garden designs. Flowers are yellow and appear around the top of the plant during the summer.

The golden barrel cactus is considered one of the easiest cactus to care for, and is a relatively fast grower in warm climates. They are happiest with an average minimum winter temperature of 54°F but can tolerate brief periods of lower temperatures



down to 18°F if provided with adequate cover and frost protection. As with most succulents, the golden barrel cactus survives with less water in winter. Water pooling around the plant can lead to root rot and death of the entire plant.

Despite being endangered in its native Central Mexico, *K. grusonii* can be found in many countries on several continents in both non-native wild populations and private and public gardens. In the United Kingdom, the golden barrel cactus has gained the Royal Horticultural Society's Award of Garden Merit. Nursery growers in the United States regularly report it as one of their top selling plants.

The plant on display here belongs to me (Russel Ray, the author) and is about 8 years old. It was a single head when I planted it. It has been grown outdoors and has been subject to high temperatures of 118°F and low temperatures of 28°F, as well as rainfall of 36" to 79" annually, so I have planted it in very well-draining soil.
